- Payments for services of La Crosse School District employees are prohibited.

Applications will be reviewed on a competitive basis by the Grants Committee of the La Crosse Public Education Foundation. Priority is given for Classroom Innovation Grants that:

- meet multiple educational objectives
- align with district/school/curricular goals
- impact a variety of students and/or schools
- are collaborative
- are sustainable

I. By 05/15/2011, an author, or a series of authors, will visit Central to conduct a variety of readings and writing workshops, resulting in students becoming excited about reading and writing.

IV. What is the lifespan of this project?

This will take place over the next year and a half, but we would like to identify future sponsors of the Visiting Author Series so that this is an ongoing project.

V. Approximately how many students will be affected by this project? Explain your number.

Four to five hundred students would be affected by this project. Last year, Central alumnae Danielle Trussoni, on a detour from her national book tour, gave an author reading, and approximately 300 students attended the event (on a Saturday, no less!) as well as approximately 100 community members. In addition, a number of students participated in the food preparation and media coverage that were not able to actually attend the reading. If we are able to contract with an author who will conduct a reading as well as give writing workshops in the classrooms, we will be able to substantially increase the number of students affected.

VI. Please state how you will collaborate with... Other organizations in the community (if applicable)

Last year, we worked with local TV and radio stations as well as the <u>La Crosse Tribune</u> in covering Danielle Trussoni's visit. We put posters and flyers in 30-40 local businesses. We contacted JavaVino about providing beverages for the author reception. We talked with the various branches of the public library about advertising our event and making books available. We worked with local bookstores about buying large numbers of the author's books for the author signing (we sold over 300 books at the event—NOT at a profit. For many students, this was the first book they had ever bought).

Other schools in the district (if applicable)

We will post flyers at Longfellow, Lincoln, and Logan. Last year, the Logan librarian promoted the book within the school book club as well as created a display of the author's work. We would do the same this year.

Other departments/classrooms (if applicable)

We will work with the Foods Department, the Art Department, possibly the Business/Marketing Department, as well with the Nutrition and Food Services(cafeteria) and Custodial departments, and, of course, administration.

VII. What will happen to the project at the conclusion of the grant? If it is to continue, how will it be sustained?

We will create a Hall of Writers in the English Department hallways, framing autographed copies of pictures of the authors who have visited Central High School. We will contact potential future sponsors about sustaining this grant so the Visiting Author Series is able to continue.

VIII. How could the project be shared with other teachers and schools to benefit more students? We will discuss the project at faculty meetings, asking for suggestions from other departments about how a professional author visit might enhance their classes. Last year, teachers from other departments created assignments geared towards Danielle Trussoni's new book, Angelology, in order to get the students more involved.

Section 5: Summary:

How will this project bring visibility to LPEF in the community?

The LPEF will be mentioned in the media coverage of the event as well as on various posters and flyers distributed throughout the community. The La Crosse Public Education Foundation's grant would cover not only the author honorarium, but also allow us to open the reading to the public, working with local businesses to get the word out, and host an author reception after the reading. Similar to other communities' "One Community, One Book" programs which encourage a town to bond over a common project, this event could bring the city of La Crosse together in the shared passion of reading. What more could a school and a community desire?

Please provide a one paragraph summary of your project including an explanation of why we should fund your project.

Data supports that the decline in reading ability is consistent and alarming and that all progress appears to halt as children enter their teenage years. This decline not only affects academic performance, but also has "demonstrable social, economic, cultural, and civic implications." (National Endowment of the Arts) Getting teenagers excited again about reading is of the utmost importance; one way of doing this is to introduce students to people who have made careers of writing literature. Authors tend to take on celebrity status when they make appearances in high schools, and students' reading of the author's books—as well as other books in general—increases. Through the Visiting Author Series, English Department faculty at Central High School will contact authors about conducting readings and workshops for students. The readings will be open to the public and advertised widely throughout the community. Students and English department faculty will work extensively with staff throughout the school as well as with local businesses in arranging an author reception. Central was able to hold an author reading last year with a former Central graduate whose publisher was willing to grant her a slight detour on a nationwide book tour, allowing her to speak at Central free of charge. This will not be possible in the future. We would like to continue to offer author appearances at Central High School, but this will not be possible without financial help from sponsors who support literature and the arts in schools.
